Applicants to the Professional Specialization Certificate in Collections Management must normally hold a bachelor's degree or its equivalent, be admissible to the University of Victoria, and have a minimum of two years of related professional experience in the sector.



Students who are admitted to the PSC CM program are eligible to apply concurrently to the Diploma in Cultural Resource Management and incorporate the certificate courses as electives for the diploma. Concurrent program students can graduate with both credentials.



Learn preventive conservation with a focus on identifying and quantifying the environmental factors or agents of deterioration that affect collections, and on developing strategies that mitigate those factors.

#### **Curatorial Planning and Practice AHVS 488X**

Develop an understanding of the theory and practice of curating in art, history, anthropology, science and interdisciplinary museums, and the ways in which curators engage with cultural heritage resources, develop sustainable collections, and generate and share associated knowledge to meet the needs of diverse communities.
